Her passion for the environment and community wellness played a key role in the ongoing success and expansion of the GM&O Trail and the improvement of numerous parks across the City. Whether advocating for safer pedestrian routes, supporting tree-planting initiatives, or expanding recreational opportunities for families, her work helped shape Columbia into the vibrant, green community it is today.

Centerville Road Reconstruction Phase 2

The Centerville Road Reconstruction Phase 2 Project is anticipated to begin in late summer or early fall. Baxmeyer Construction, Inc. will serve as the contractor for this phase.

The project includes new pavement, curb and gutter, storm sewer, sanitary sewer, and water main installation along:

- Centerville from Columbia to Riebeling
- Columbia from Centerville to the Dead End
- Kremmel from Centerville to Schmidt

Once construction begins, and weather permitting, the project is expected to take 6 to 8 weeks to complete. Residents and motorists are advised to watch for detours and lane closures during this time. Your patience and cooperation are greatly appreciated as these improvements are carried out.

Cybercriminals are becoming more sophisticated, and scams via phone (vishing) and text (smishing) on the rise. Scammers may pose as banks or government agencies, in attempts to steal your personal information or infect your device with malicious software.

Stay Safe:

- If a call or text seems suspicious, hang up or delete it.
- Never Click on unfamiliar links
- Contact the organization directly using a verified phone number
- Remember: legitimate companies will never ask for personal information via phone or text.

Water Division - Watermain replacement on North Evergreen, Cascade, South Metter Avenue and Quarry Road

Sewer Division - General Maintenance including sewer line jetting to help prevent backups and lagoon upgrades

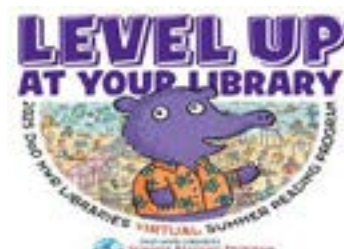
Attention Business & Multi-Family Building Owners
