## BACKFLOW PREVENTION DEVICE SURVEY

**Every two years the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency requires the City of Columbia to survey its water customers about backflow prevention devices. The survey is to determine if a water customer has or needs a backflow prevention device on their distribution system. Some items that may require backflow prevention devices are boilers and irrigation systems. At commercial establishments some specialty equipment may require a backflow prevention device.**

**In an effort to make this survey as convenient as possible the City will allow the survey to be completed online. Follow the directions in the notice to access the survey online. If you do not have a backflow prevention device you will just need to note such. The IEPA requires a participation rate of at least 90% for this survey. Your cooperation in participating and quickly completing the survey would be greatly appreciated. The City will have to continue to seek participation in the survey until the 90% participation is achieved.**

**As a reminder all backflow prevention devices need to be tested annually and certified they are properly working. If you have any questions concerning the survey or backflow prevention devices you may call the Public Works office at 618-281-4264.**

**FIVE (5) LARGE ITEMS IS THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT ALLOWED. NO TRASH STICKERS ARE NEEDED FOR THE FIRST TWO (2) LARGE ITEMS. THE NEXT THREE (3) LARGE ITEMS WILL NEED THREE (3) \$1.00 TRASH STICKERS ATTACHED TO EACH ITEM.**

*Stickers are sold at the Market Place, Columbia Market, Ace Hardware of Columbia and the Clerk's Office at City Hall.*

**LARGE ITEMS INCLUDED:** Appliances, (Doors, compressors, and electric motors must be removed from appliances. Compressors and electric motors may then be discarded in the regular trash), furniture, televisions (no big screen televisions), hot water heaters, mattresses, box springs, treadmills (no need to remove motors), swing sets (have to be disassembled and no concrete attached to bottom of the legs) and push lawn mowers. (Push lawn mowers must have all fluids drained and tires removed.)

**LARGE ITEMS NOT INCLUDED:** Construction materials (i.e. glass, carpeting, wood, doors, paneling, drywall, windows, shutters, siding, concrete, porcelain fixtures, bath tubs, toilets, cabinets, counter tops, sinks), landscape waste, tires, big screen televisions, hot tubs, riding lawn mowers, gas tanks, mirrors, pianos, organs, swimming pools, pool tables, arcade games, portable basketball hoops and camper shells.

## Summertime Safety For Children From the Columbia Police Department



Summertime is here! One of the most common sights around the City of Columbia during the summer months is children riding bikes, skateboards, and rollerblading. The Columbia Police Department would like to remind everyone to use caution when riding anything with wheels and remind everyone to respect other people's property and not ride where it is posted or prohibited. It is our goal to reduce the number of injuries to children in our community by encouraging them to wear helmets anytime they ride anything with wheels on it.

With the assistance of local pediatrician Dr. Joe Cangas and his Helmets First organization, the officers of the Columbia Police Department will be looking for children riding bikes and wearing their helmets. When officers locate these children they will give them a reward from Dr. Cangas and Helmets First. The rewards include baseball tickets, football tickets, tickets for free stays at vacation spots, as well as free food and desserts from local businesses in Columbia. ### Heart Attacks & Time Critical Diagnosis - What this means to you!

Time Critical Diagnosis (TCD) is a commonly used phrase when referring to time-sensitive medical conditions. Today we will discuss how this affects the heart attack victim; as well as the team-based approach developed to help ensure a positive outcome.

Numerous technological and procedural improvements have been made in the last few years in the area of cardiac care. A crucial pre-hospital advancement was training and equipping EMS personnel with 12-lead cardiac monitoring devices. By doing this, your EMS paramedics are able to better diagnose a heart attack early on in the event. These EKG's are then transmitted from the scene to the hospital and a full assessment is given to an awaiting cardiac team. This gives nurses and Cardiologists a "head start" in preparing the cardiac catheterization lab for your arrival.

This team-based approach called "E2B" is a 90-minute targeted approach where the clock starts running at the time the first EMS 12-lead EKG is completed ("E"), until the balloon is inflated in your coronary artery in the catheterization lab ("B"). This 90 minutes is broken down by the "30-30-30" goal for E2B. EMS, E.R. & cath lab each have 30 minutes to perform their specific duties.

Research has proven the "E2B" 90-minute window has dramatically improved patient outcomes! With this in mind, our latest goal is to improve our 90-minute window to include "**onset of pain to balloon**". This is where **you**, the potential patient, or the public gets involved. Early recognition of the problem and early activation of the 911 system seems to be the weakest link in the chain of survival. In referring to heart attack victims, a commonly used phrase is: "*Time is Muscle*"! Delaying the call for help or driving yourself to the hospital with chest pain could dramatically worsen the damage to your heart muscle and possibly prove fatal. Calling 911 for EMS and initiating the E2B team-based approach is your best chance of survival and quality of life.
