Restoring Historic Schools

Three Efforts Combine to Restore Historic Schools!

Education has always been important to the residents of Columbia. This month, three diverse efforts are combining to highlight the importance of education to the history of our community by means of a unique new program.

Renovation of three historic schools—Shoemaker School, Sand Bank School, and St. Paul Lutheran School—has been in the works for several years, but the pace has quickened considerably this past year. Shoemaker School, which is very visible and convenient to visitors at the intersection of Gall Rd. & Illinois Route 3, is currently being renovated by the City of Columbia into the Monroe County Welcome Center (anticipated opening later this month). Sand Bank School, located off Old Bluff Rd. just north of Sand Bank Rd., is being renovated through a new project recently initiated by Monroe County Partners. The Lutheran school building has been targeted for renovation for several years, and efforts have been renewed recently by an enthusiastic group of volunteers.

The supporters of each of these projects have decided to join forces to jointly promote all three projects and raise funds. While restored one room schools can be found in many Illinois communities, project leaders believe that the concentration of three schools in one community is unique, as is the accessibility they hope to provide to the public. The Monroe County Welcome Center is projected to be open daily with access to the renovated historic building provided on a regular basis, something that is hard to find elsewhere.

Leaders for the three school renovation projects have joined forces to raise additional funds. Their common venue will be the sale of engraved stones in a new courtyard at Shoemaker School which will be commemorating all historic schools in Monroe County. Between 1890 and 1955, more than 60 schools dotted the county under the directive that no child should have to walk more than two miles to school. The new courtyard will allow residents to commemorate parents or grandparents who attended or taught at these Monroe County schools, as well as to commemorate the schools themselves.

Fall Tips from the Columbia Fire and Police Departments



Halloween Costume Tips:

- When shopping for costumes, wigs and accessories, purchase only those with a label indicating they are flame resistant (are made of flame retardant material). If they are homemade, make sure to use either a fire retardant spray or fabric that has been treated with fire retardant.
- Make sure your child's costume includes reflective material; a flash light or light will make them more visible at night. This will assure that they are seen by drivers and will help you keep an eye on them if they get ahead of you while trick-or-treating.
- Do not include high heel shoes or long dangling pieces of costume that your child could trip over. A scraped knee or bloody nose can really spoil their fun. Make sure that shoes fit well and that costumes are short enough to prevent tripping, entanglement or contact with flame.
- If they are carrying a prop such as a scythe or sword, make sure they are made out of a flexible plastic that will bend if fallen on. Most of the props available today are made of flexible plastic.
- Because a mask can limit or block eyesight, consider non-toxic and hypoallergenic makeup or a decorative hat as a safe alternative. If your child is wearing a mask, make sure that the eye holes are big enough to see not only in front but peripherally as well—you may have to enlarge them. If so, use some black or gray grease paint around the eye socket to cover skin.
- Always trick-or-treat in groups, never alone. Make your child's costume a unique one so you can spot them easily in a crowded area. Use flashing lights or jewelry to make them stand out. Secure emergency identification (name, address, phone number) discreetly within Halloween attire or on a bracelet.
- Remind your children not to eat any candy or other treats until you have had a chance to inspect it.
- Whether you're going to trick-or-treat in the City of Columbia or in another city, you should visit the Illinois State Police website at www.isp.state.il.us to review the location of sex offenders. The Columbia Police Department would like you to report any suspicious activity that you observe. This can be done by calling 281-5151 or in an emergency 911.

UTILITY BILL DIRECT DEPOSIT

SIRENS IN COLUMBIA

There are three (3) sirens located in the City of Columbia:

1. City Hall
2. Parkview Elementary School on Veterans Parkway
3. Columbia Lakes at the Diehl water tank



The sirens are sounded at 12:00 noon and 6:00 pm, Monday through Saturday; not on Sundays. This is a routine procedure that tests the sirens. For a fire emergency, the sirens sound four (4) times, between 6:00 am and 10:00 pm. For a tornado or disaster, the sirens sound one (1) time for three (3) consecutive minutes, 24 hours a day, as a warning that everyone should seek immediate shelter.

Plan Commission Seeks Input on Aging Assessment

Increased life expectancy is creating record numbers of people aged 65 and older. While this age group represented only 13% of the population in 2000, it will comprise about 21% of the population in 2030. The group expected to grow most rapidly in the next 30 years is the one aged 85 years and older.

Over the past several months, members of Columbia's Plan Commission have been undertaking an assessment of the local community and its readiness for the impact of an aging population upon various aspects of community life. In this task, the Commission has used assessment tools provided by the Area Agency on Aging of Southwestern Illinois. While identifying challenges confronting Columbia in the various areas assessed, the Commission also hopes to identify many of the positive features that already make this city a very desirable community for the aged—and for other citizens—now and in the future.

Public input is encouraged as the Commission prepares its final report. Draft copies of the assessment document are available for download from the City website or at the City Hall, and members of the public are invited to review the document and offer comments. The Plan Commission will hold an open house to review the assessment in the very near future, as well.



Columbia Named 'Playful City USA' for 2010

For the second year in a row, Columbia has again earned recognition as a Playful City USA despite difficult budgetary conditions in the wake of the economic downturn. Playful City USA is a national recognition program honoring cities and towns determined to prioritize play and ensure that children are healthy by providing the time and space for play.

The designation is a tribute to the work of the Play Commission, a nine-member citizen body that advises the City Council on issues related to parks & recreation. National non-profit KaBOOM! this year recognized 118 cities across the country, including Columbia, as Playful City USA communities.



Stroke & Time Critical Diagnosis

In the last edition of our newsletter, we discussed *Time-Critical Diagnosis* (TCD) and how early recognition and summoning of EMS can drastically improve the survivability of a heart attack victim. This edition will discuss the same concept for the stroke patient.

Time is critical when diagnosing a stroke. The sooner the patient or the lay public recognizes the symptoms and calls EMS, the sooner the *stroke-team* at an appropriate hospital can be activated. Research has proven that a 3-hour window of time from the beginning of a stroke until appropriate treatment is critical for a positive prognosis.

Once again this proves what an important role the patient and/or the public plays in improving the outcome of a serious illness. Typical symptoms of a stroke are; sudden numbness, paralysis, weakness in your face, arm, leg (especially on just one side of your body), trouble with walking or balance, drooling, slurred speech, trouble speaking or understanding, feeling confused and/or a sudden or severe headache different from past headaches.

Once these symptoms are recognized and 911 is called for help, your arriving EMS team will make a rapid assessment and provide supportive care. The most crucial action your Paramedic will take is activating the nearest hospital's *stroke-team*. This quickly assembles doctors and other specialists that administer clot-dissolving drugs and other invasive therapies to prevent permanent damage to the patient's brain. Remember, you can make a difference by acting quickly and not hesitating to call for help!

LIMB AND LEAF PICK UP PROGRAM FOR 2010

The limb pick up service for Fall 2010 will take place the weeks beginning on October 4th and October 11th. If you have limbs to be picked up please have them by the curb in front of your residence by 6:00 am on either Monday, October 4th or Monday, October 11th.

The leaf pick up service will begin on Monday, October 25th and continue until Friday, December 3rd. You may place your leaves by the curb, but not in the street, at any time. Continual sweeps will be made through the City to pick up the leaves. It is recommended that if possible, you cover the pile(s) of leaves so they do not get wet, which makes the leaves difficult to pick up. Leaf pick up will not occur prior to October 25th or past December 3rd. Piles of leaves should be free of grass clippings, limbs, branches and twigs, acorns, gumballs or any items other than leaves. The leaf vacuums cannot pick up these types of items.

OLD TOWN PROJECT

After a lengthy construction time, a contractor having financial difficulties and some uncooperative weather, the Old Town Project is finally coming to a conclusion. Some very minor items remain to be addressed concerning the construction work, and the final paperwork needs to be processed. The Public Works Department would like to thank the traveling public, and in particular the residents in the Old Town and surrounding areas, for their patience and understanding. We knew the project would not be an easy one to complete, but the issues that occurred during construction made it far more difficult and inconvenient than envisioned. Through diligence, perseverance and some intense hand wringing the project has been completed. We hope the residents and traveling public enjoy and utilize this major transportation improvement.

Did You Know?

In 1959, Columbia's centennial was celebrated with a large festival. In 1960, the Strassenfest (Street Festival), a three-day festival celebrating the German heritage of the community, was established. The Strassenfest became so popular that it had to be moved to St. Louis in 1972, where it attracted more than 100,000 visitors over a three-day period every year.
