Spring has sprung and your City Council is refreshed and working hard. I could not be prouder of the city's department heads and appointed and elected officials. They are making the tough decisions in these difficult economic times. It is impressive to see the out of the box thinking and ideas allowing the city to accomplish more with fewer resources. Thank you department heads, Aldermen and your elected and appointed officials. Keep up the good work!

The city has contracted with Good Energy, L.P. to assist in reducing the cost of electricity for the city's residents and small commercial account customers. The initial step to allow this to occur will be in the form of a referendum on the March 20<sup>th</sup> ballot -- if passed (a majority of voters voting yes) the city will be allowed to select an electricity supplier for its residents and small commercial account customers (through a bidding process) resulting in reduced electricity costs; those not wishing to participate in the choice of the city selected provider will have the ability to "opt out" and select their own provider. You should be receiving information in the mail near the beginning of March through Good Energy's marketing and awareness campaign effort. Please get out and vote on March 20<sup>th</sup>.

Updates on legislative issues from Springfield appear in my monthly newsletters; please feel free to contact me with your areas of interest. The Illinois Municipal League has launched a campaign asking state legislators to "Save our Cities". We are asking them to (i) pay local governments the state income taxes due them on a timely basis; (ii) consider pension reforms; the current plans are unsustainable and creating financial difficulties for the state and local governments; and (iii) discontinue mandates and additional programs for local governments (including school districts) that transfer financial burdens to local taxpayers. I applaud Senator Luechtefeld and Representative Costello for their support of local governments.

### SOUTH MAIN STREET AND ILLINOIS ROUTE 3 CONSTRUCTION

The Illinois Department of Transportation received bids for the South Main Street and Illinois Route 3 Intersection Improvement Project. Baxmeyer Construction has been awarded a contract for the construction work. The project will widen South Main Street to provide two left turn lanes onto Southbound Illinois Route 3. As part of this project South Main Street will need to be closed for approximately eight (8) weeks. Although a definitive schedule has yet to be determined it is anticipated the work will take place beginning around or sometime after April 1<sup>st</sup>. A detour will be marked for Carl Street to Legion to Main Street. No commercial business drives will be disturbed with the construction and will remain open to traffic at all times. The City will be discussing ideas with Baxmeyer Construction and the Illinois Department of Transportation to aid in speeding the construction of the project in order to keep the closure of South Main Street to a minimum. ### REDUCE, REUSE & RECYCLE EVENT APRIL 21ST COLUMBIA HIGH SCHOOL PARKING LOT

#### THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WILL BE ACCEPTED:

**NICE TWICE:** (10 am—3 pm) Gently used clothing, shoes, furniture, toys and household items.

**COLUMBIA LIBRARY:** (10 am—3pm) Gently used books. Encyclopedias and text books will NOT be accepted.

**RELIABLE SANITATION:** (10 am—3pm) Providing trash truck for large non-recyclable items (not larger than a recliner) for City of Columbia residents only. A recycle truck will also be available for glass, plastic, cardboard and aluminum.

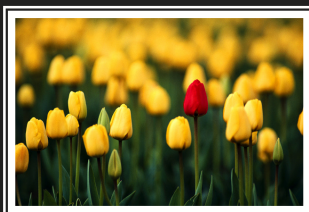
**WEB INNOVATION & TECHNOLOGIES (WITS):** (10 am—4pm) Computer equipment, TVs, phones, household electronics, audio/video equipment, lawn mowers & batteries. There is a suggested drop-off donation of \$5 for computer monitors, laptops and TVs. A \$5 fee is required for large appliances and all Freon-containing devices. Everything else may be dropped-off free of charge.

**DOCUMENT DESTRUCTION SERVICES:** (10 am—1pm) Shredding paper documents while you wait. Thanks to Columbia National Bank and Midland States Bank for sponsoring this service.

**NOT ACCEPTING:** Paints, household chemicals and tires.

### UTILITY BILL DIRECT DEPOSIT

Don't forget you can sign up for direct debit payment of your monthly utility bill. This is a free service and can be initiated by completing a direct debit form which is available at City Hall.



### LANDSCAPE WASTE REMOVAL

Landscape waste removal is scheduled every Tuesday for the entire city from March through November.

- Bags for removal of the landscape waste can be purchased at the Market Place and Columbia Market (\$1.25/bag) or you may purchase your own landscape bags.
- A \$1.00 Reliable Sanitation trash sticker must be attached to each landscape waste bag. These stickers are sold at Columbia Market, Market Place, Columbia Ace Hardware and the Clerk's Office.
- Set bags out at the curb by 6:00 a.m.
- There is no landscape waste removal during the months of December, January & February.

## News from Columbia School District



Columbia Unit School District is proud to announce several recent accomplishments. The Illinois State Board of Education recently released the Academic Excellence Awards for schools showing exemplary results on the 2011 state tests. Parkview School (second year in a row) and Columbia Middle School were recognized for having 90 percent of students meeting or exceeding state standards in reading and math for the three most recent school years. This award defines the hard work displayed by the students, teachers, and parents. On the extra-curricular side, the Columbia cheerleading squad placed first at the IHSA and ICCA state competition for three straight years in a row. This "three-peat" is being celebrated by the entire school community!

Other developments include two facility projects that are underway. Under the direction of teacher Dan Young, the Construction Class is building a Press Box addition thanks to grant funding and donations from the Athletic Boosters and Music Boosters. In addition, through in-kind donations, private donations, and local school funds, the district will be replacing the existing football field with a multi-purpose field to be used by the CMS and CHS physical education department as well as football, soccer, and band programs. Over 1200 students will be able to use the new field on a regular basis. Planning for the 2011-2012 school year has already begun. Two agricultural classes will be offered at the high school which will allow our students to experience after school FFA activities. Eagleview Elementary will be offering two tuition based preschool programs next year – a morning program and a full day program for 4 and 5 year olds. Registration is now being accepted. The after school program, Eagle Zone, will also be an option for parents who need after school child care.

Last but not least, the P.T.A. is sponsoring a trivia night and silent auction on March 31<sup>st</sup> at Columbia Turner Hall. Tickets are now on sale and proceeds will benefit student programs at Columbia School District. Please join the fun!

## BUDGET TIME

The City is in the process of preparing the budget for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 2012 and ending April 30, 2013. At each Committee of the Whole meeting from now until mid-April, City Administrator, Al Hudzik, and Accounting Manager, Linda Sharp, will discuss various components of the budget. Topics covered will include projected revenue, projected expenditures, capital projects, equipment purchases, cash flow projections and fee schedule adjustments. The budget will be posted for public inspection in mid-April.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE COLUMBIA POLICE DEPARTMENT

The members of the Columbia Police Department (CPD) are pleased that when people talk about our community, they talk about our low crime rate, outstanding schools, and the high quality of life. However, our community is not exempt from unfortunate events. February 8, 2012, should have been an eye opener for all the citizens of Columbia.

On February 8, 2012, the Columbia Police Department in cooperation with the United State's Attorney's office in the Southern District of Illinois, charged thirty-one year old, Jacob Nelson, from Duplo, Illinois with one count of Distribution of a Controlled Substance Causing Death. We have alleged that Nelson provided a Columbia resident with heroin and that heroin caused our resident's death. Nelson was also charged with Maintaining Drug-Involved Premises and two additional counts of Possession of a Firearm by a User of Controlled Substances. Nelson is facing life in prison for these offenses.

The entire metropolitan region has seen an increase in drug overdoses, specifically heroin. This drug is killing both life-long and first-time users. In 2011, the CPD and the Columbia EMS Department responded to 10 drug overdose cases. Through January of this year we have already responded to 3 drug overdoses. If this trend continues we will see more than three times the number of overdoses we handled last year. If this occurs, the number of deaths will unfortunately increase.

We are asking our entire community to be aware of the signs of heroin use. Some of the changes you might see in someone using heroin include a **sudden change in behavior**. They might avoid interaction with former acquaintances, take unexplained trips, and have difficulty holding conversations. **Physical changes** may include dilated pupils, drooping eyelids, and vomiting. Their appetite may decrease and they may suddenly have a dramatic loss of weight. Additional signs may include coughing and sneezing, needle marks, runny nose, constant sniffing, and a slower rate of breathing. Because heroin can be injected, smoked, or snorted, you may also see **drug paraphernalia** on their person or in their immediate surroundings. This could include needles, spoons, glass pipes, razor blades and straws.

These are only a few signs of heroin use. We need your help to reduce and prevent heroin deaths and other drug overdoses. If you would like more information please contact the CPD at 281-5151 and request to speak with one of our police officers.
