Explore Columbia!



The City of Columbia, the Play Commission, and the HeartLands Conservancy are holding an open house for all residents who want to participate in "Explore Columbia!" on Thursday, September 6th, at Columbia City Hall. Citizens may stop by anytime between 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. to view a draft of the proposed new pedestrian and bicycle facilities plan incorporating results from surveys, the first open house, and a walking workshop.

This plan will be a long-range comprehensive proposal for how to improve walking and bicycling conditions throughout Columbia, making it easier for people of all ages and abilities to safely and comfortably reach parks, schools, shopping areas, and other important community destinations by foot, bike, or other means of alternative transportation. Details will include locations and conditions assessments of sidewalks, multi-use trails, and other routes that will allow the City to easily apply for grants and other funding sources to complete projects.

Results from the open house will be used to produce the final "Explore Columbia!" plan to make Columbia a better, safer place to walk and bike for people of all ages. Local businesses and organizations such as Walgreens and the Columbia Bike Center will display their products and/or services. Stop by and chat with business representatives, view the recommendations for bicycle and pedestrian facilities, and enter a raffle to win a gift certificate to use at the Columbia Bike Center!

The Explore Columbia planning process started earlier this year with the launch of the "Explore Columbia!" survey. An open house held on June 26th provided an opportunity for citizens to voice their comments, concerns, and suggestions for walking and biking in Columbia. A walking workshop held on Saturday, August 11th provided residents with an opportunity to take a walk with planners and city officials to point out areas where constructed features make walking safer, as well as other areas which may need improvement, culminating with each participant giving Columbia a "walkability" score.



VOTER REGISTRATION

MOVED WITHIN THE CITY OF COLUMBIA

If you have moved within the City of Columbia, you may call the Monroe County Clerk's Office at 618-939-8681 to change your address or you may complete the Transfer of Registration form on the back of your current voter registration card and mail it to the Monroe County Clerk's Office. Either way, a new voter registration card will be mailed to you.

MOVED FROM ANOTHER ILLINOIS COUNTY, MOVED FROM OUT OF STATE, NAME CHANGE BY MARRIAGE, NEW REGISTRATIONS

The last day the City Clerk's Office can register voters for the November 6th election is Tuesday, October 9th. Two forms of identification (Driver's License with current address, current utility bill, bank statement, tax bill, car/homeowner's insurance) are required and registration must be made in person. Your social security number is also required on the registration form. The City Clerk's Office is open Monday thru Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Saturday 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 Noon.

TEMPLE STREET SIDEWALK PROJECT COMPLETED

The City of Columbia Public Works Department crews officially completed the Temple Street Sidewalk project on Monday, August 6, 2012. The project included the construction of storm sewer, curb and gutter, sidewalk, a concrete street approach and associated side road work. As everyone is well aware the summer was brutal due to the extended heat and humidity making working conditions particularly difficult. The Department of Public Works worked through the adverse weather conditions to complete the project and provide another link in the intermodal transportation system of the city by tying sidewalk along Main Street to Bolm-Schuhkraft Park. The property owners and residents were gracious in granting the necessary easements for the project and dealing with the inconvenience of the construction activities. The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Development reimbursed a majority of the project's labor, equipment and materials costs through a grant awarded to the city. It is hoped the residents of the City of Columbia will utilize and enjoy this addition to the city's ever expanding sidewalk and trail system.

CROSSWALK SAFETY REMINDER

The Officers of the Columbia Police Department would like to remind motorists of the numerous crosswalks in the downtown district of Main Street and throughout the city that the Illinois Vehicle Code states - *The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way, slowing down or stopping to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk*. Simply stated, you must stop to allow a person to cross the street before you drive through the crosswalk. However, a pedestrian should not suddenly leave a curb and walk/run into the path of a moving vehicle. Columbia Police Officers will continue to monitor crosswalk intersections, along with crossing guards and various school officials during school crosswalk hours. Please use the necessary care when approaching all crosswalks.



HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

- Always trick-or-treat in groups, never alone. Use flashing lights or jewelry to make your child stand out.
- Make sure your child's costume includes reflective material; a flash light or light will make them more visible at night.
- If your child is wearing a mask, make sure that the eye holes are big enough to see not only in front but peripherally as well—you may have to enlarge them.
- Remind your child not to eat any candy or other treats until you have had a chance to inspect it.

The City of Columbia Announces Credit & Debit Payment Options

Beginning in early September 2012, customers who wish to make payments to the City of Columbia using credit and debit cards may do so through GovPayNet. GovPayNet accepts MasterCard, Visa, American Express and Discover debit and prepaid debit card brands for payments twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week on-site, online (www.govpaynow.com) or by phone (1-888-604-7888). They need only have some basic information regarding the payment which is easily provided by the City of Columbia.

Cardholders pay a service fee to GovPayNet at the time of their transaction. There are no charges to the City of Columbia for participation in the GovPayNet service. Improving the convenience of taxpayer transactions with the City of Columbia means more frequent and timely payments, improved services and reduced taxpayer expenses.

GovPayNet handles all cardholder calls and inquiries about issues with payments. GovPayNet is an excellent opportunity for the City of Columbia to be at the forefront in offering convenient, flexible payment options.

News from Columbia Unit School District

Welcome back to the 2012-2013 school year! Columbia Unit School District #4 would like to welcome two new administrators to Columbia High School: Principal Jason Dandurand and Assistant Principal Jeanne Goacher. Both are veteran educators who bring much knowledge and experience to CUSD4. Mr. Reeves, the prior Assistant Principal at the high school, has moved to the middle school as the new principal. Mr. Reeves replaces Dr. Chamberlain who recently retired.

Other district news:

- The new multi-purpose field is now complete with students at the high school and middle school sharing use. The grand opening event took place on August 7th with midnight football practice taking place right after. The field will be the new home for outdoor physical education classes, practice and game field for girls' and boys' soccer teams, football teams, and the marching band. Funding for the field consisted of private donations (50%), in-kind contributions (20%), and school district funds (30%). A formal dedication ceremony will soon be planned to recognize those individuals who played a key role toward making this project a reality.
- FFA is back at Columbia High School! Mrs. Carrie Koester is leading the charge as new instructor and FFA sponsor for our students. The district is very pleased to have great support from the newly formed Columbia Agri-Science Association consisting of area FFA alumni and supporters. - The Press Box was nearly completed over the summer months. In the Spring, the construction class was responsible for building an addition and renovating the existing concession stand area. The construction class will finish the interior after football season. The Music Boosters, Columbia Athletic Booster Club, and a private grant funded this construction class project.

A new concept will soon be launched entitled Columbia PRIDE. The PRIDE is an acronym for Private Revenue and In-Kind Donations for Education. The capital campaign that helped fund the multi-purpose field was the first Columbia PRIDE project. Very soon, a link to the district's website will be added to describe Columbia PRIDE and how individuals can support school initiatives falling in various areas of education: academic, fine arts, athletic, and general items.
