CITIZENS URGED TO SIGN UP & UPDATE CURRENT EMERGENCY WARNING SYSTEM

In an effort to improve the timeliness and effectiveness that Monroe County uses to warn citizens of oncoming emergencies, the county and all of its municipalities have contracted with new company. Emergency Communications Network will provide its CodeRED high-speed notification solution to Monroe County. The county had used Global Connect since 2010.

"The CodeRED system provides officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire county" said Ryan Weber, Monroe County's Director of Emergency Management.

Weber added he believes county citizens will prefer the new CodeRED system. The main change is that this system will make the emergency weather notifications, including warnings for tornados, severe thunderstorms and flash floods, by it using the National Weather Services "polygon" method. This means the notifications will better target the areas of the county affected by severe weather, while those not under an immediate threat will not be sent a notification unless the situation changes for their area. Weber feels this new system will be more accurate than what has been done in the past.

In addition, the new system also allows each residence to choose which weather alerts they receive. "If someone wants to be notified about a tornado warning and nothing else, then they can," said Weber. "Or they can choose to receive any and all types of weather alerts."

The means of notifying citizens of approaching emergencies has also expanded. The notifications can be delivered by phone, through a landline or a cell phone. In addition, notifications can be delivered by a text message or email—it will be your choice.

Weber also wanted to state that regular weather warning alerts will no longer originate from the EMA office at the Monroe County Courthouse. In special circumstances, the local EMA will be able to send out a warning.

All Monroe County citizens are urged to immediately sign up for CodeRED. The county's current alert notification database through the Global Connect system has been moved to CodeRED, "but no one should automatically assume his or her phone number is included" said Weber.

To sign up, verify or update your contact information, Weber requests that all individuals and businesses log onto their city's website or the Monroe County website, <http://www.monroecountyil.org>. Follow the link to the "CodeRED Community Notification Enrollment" page. Those without Internet access may call their city hall or the Monroe County EMA office at 618-939-8681, ext. 231. If no one answers, please leave a message and someone will return your call.

The CodeRED system allows geographically based delivery, which means street addresses are required to ensure the proper individuals in any given situation receive emergency notification calls.

"The system works for cell phones as well, but you will need to provide an associated street address to properly receive relevant messages" said Weber. He added that, in the future, those who move to another location in the county will need to update their location on the CodeRED database.

Weber assures folks that CodeRED's database and website are easy to navigate and the information you provide is secure. The data collected will only be used for emergency notification purposes. CHPC Pursues Historic Preservation Plan

Columbians are proud of the community's history, and rightly so. Although incorporation of the village of Columbia took place in 1859, settlement in this location dates back to the late 1700s and the very beginnings of the Illinois territory.

Working through the Columbia Heritage & Preservation Commission (CHPC), the City of Columbia seeks to establish the best possible foundation for future preservation efforts. A recent grant from the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency (IHPA) will help identify and evaluate current preservation efforts, recommend future efforts, and delineate how best to reach preservation goals.

The City has contracted with Historical Foundations, Inc. to develop a Comprehensive Community Preservation Plan to assemble resources such as the following:

- Landmarks designated for local recognition;
- Proposal(s) for historic district(s) ;
- Sites & structures preserved in the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS);
- Study of American home styles;
- Survey of tin roof homes;
- Survey of Sears homes;
- Survey of double door homes;
- Documents, genealogies, and other materials.



The CHPC has established a documents center, where staff and volunteers are currently reviewing the collection of records previously maintained by the Columbia Historical Society, and the City is seeking funding from the *Illinois* State Historical Records Advisory Board (ISHRAB) to augment ongoing archival work.

Consultants from Historical Foundations, the CHPC and City staff will review and evaluate these materials, culminating in a preservation planning document that will guide community efforts and be incorporated into the City's revised Comprehensive Plan.

THAT TIME OF THE YEAR FOR ROAD AND BRIDGE WORK

There will be three major road and bridge projects taking place late summer into fall in Columbia. The first one to start will be the improvement of Cherry Street from Main Street to Liberty Street. Hank's Excavating and Contracting was awarded the contract with a start date of August 19th. Work prior to the contractor starting work has been utility relocations necessary for the roadway improvements to take place. There will be street closures and detours as the construction work progresses. The schedule is for the construction work to take approximately two months to complete. The Valmeyer Road Bridge will be rehabilitated this fall. Keller Construction has been awarded the contract. The construction work will remove and replace the bridge deck and beams. A section of Valmeyer Road between D Road and Veterans Parkway will need to be closed to traffic to facilitate the work. A detour will not be marked as Bluff Road will be the only access to D Road. Construction work is anticipated to take about two months. The last improvement project is the Main Street Streetscape from Cherry to north of Oak. Keller Construction was the low bidder with a contract being prepared and signed. Although no schedule has been submitted at this time the contract calls for the project to be complete no later than December 15th. Main Street will remain open to traffic although the sidewalk and side roads will be closed at times for construction work. 
